



Income Disparity in Alberta

The equitable distribution of money and other resources is a primary indicator of the well being of a society and its demographic groups (i.e. women, children, seniors, middle and low income families, the disabled, etc.). The wealth of Alberta has increased dramatically but this wealth has not been distributed evenly.

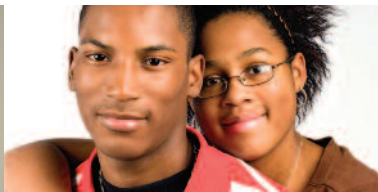
Research shows that the income gains made during the current economic boom in Alberta have been made almost entirely by the top 40% of income earners. This means the remaining 60% have either maintained or lost financial ground during this same period of time.

Impact

Alberta's prosperity has increased the gap between the haves and have nots. The inequitable distribution of resources has magnified its impact. There is now more homelessness, more working poor, an affordable housing crisis, an employment crisis in non-profit agencies and many other social problems. Alberta's boom is not helping most income earners and disadvantaged populations. It is actually pushing them deeper into debt and poverty.
